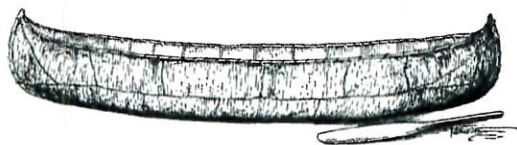


If you are travelling from outside the Upper Peninsula this is also an opportunity to experience the beauty that Bishop Baraga never tired of, regardless of the season:

**Beyond Michigan:**

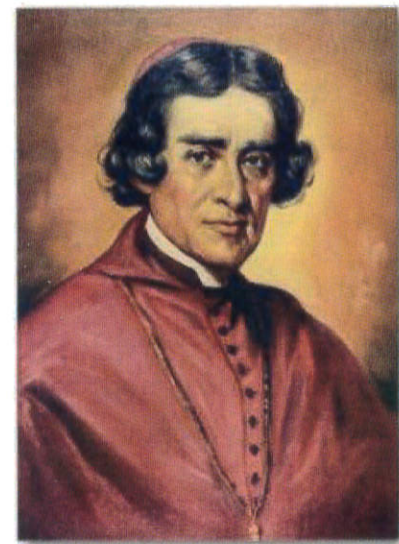
- ❖ Our Lady of Guadalupe Shrine La Crosse, WI contains a memorial dedicated to Bishop Baraga

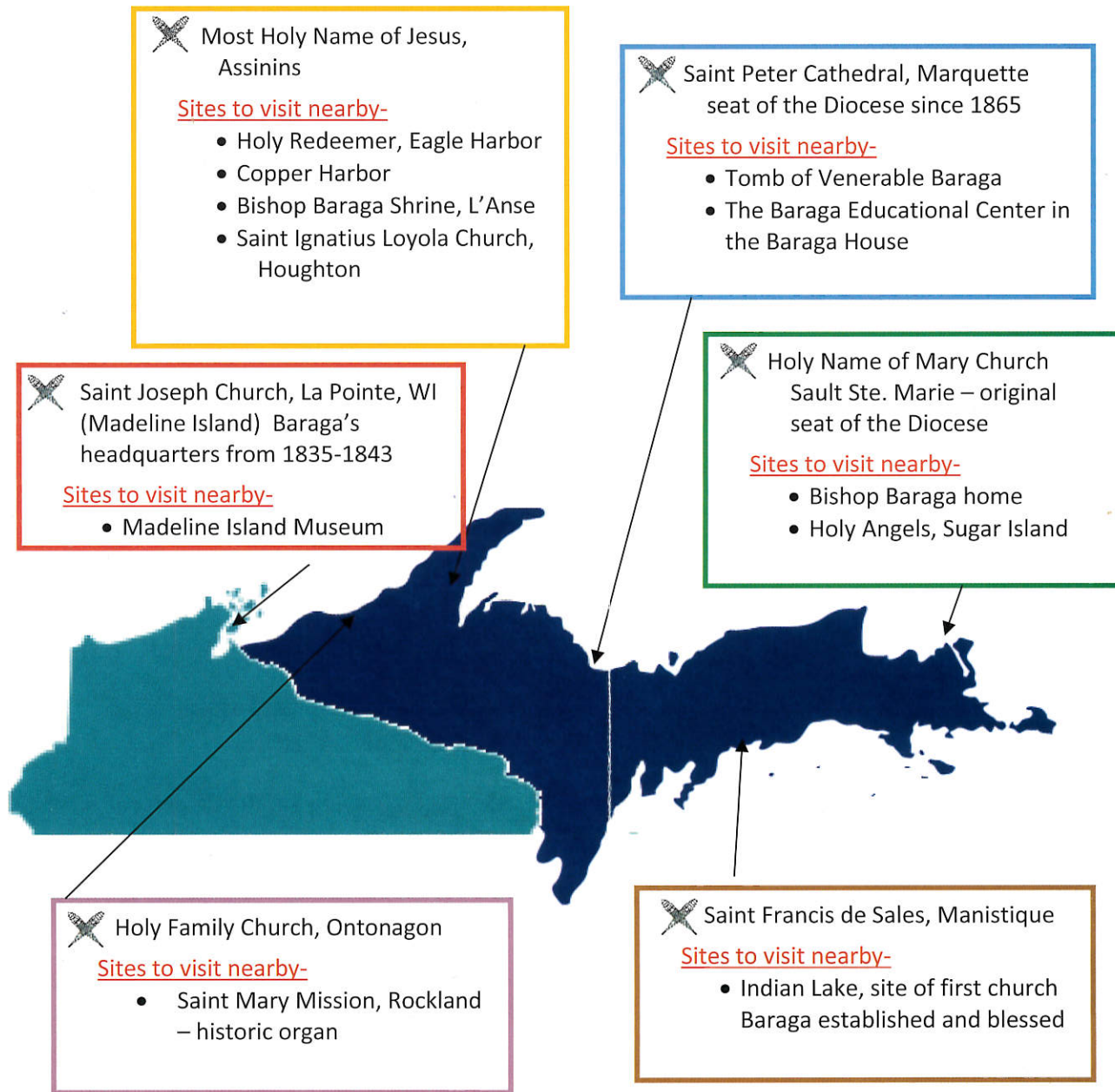
Venerable Bishop Baraga
